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
## **Buddy Project**

The Buddy project \*Do you need suppor- TO?" is a welcome and support- service for international students enrolled on a degree programme at UniTO and for international exchange students in mobility through the Erasmus+ programme or through a study abroad scheme.

A "Buddy" (a current student at UniTO) will assist international students adapting to their new academic, cultural and linguistic environment before and on arrival in Turin.

#### What a Buddy does:

- They contact you first by email
- They answer your most urgent questions (re: accommodation, academic organization, website of the University, administrative procedures on arrival, etc...)
- They assist you in finding the relevant administrative offices for your needs or help you find locations in the main university buildings (professors' offices, classrooms, canteens, libraries etc...)
- They assist you with online procedures
- They can give you tips on life in Turin




# Exchange administrative procedure

How to register your exchange correctly and get all the paperwork done smoothly!

#### **BEFORE ARRIVAL**

#### **APPLICATION FORM**

The online application form for incoming students is a MANDATORY step to start your exchange. Read the instructions and fill out the application form before arriving in Turin. Any delay in doing so will result in further delays in registering and getting your account activated.



#### WHEN IN TURIN REGISTERING YOUR ARRIVAL

#### **INFOPOINT**

Once you arrive in Torino, you will need to register at the <u>Infopoint Office</u> where you can collect your **Unito** certificate of arrival: this document confirms the date of arrival and your status as Erasmus/international exchange students at the University of Torino. Moreover, here you can also have your home University documents signed, i.e., Certificate of arrival.

#### UNITO IT AND EMAIL ACCOUNT

When you register on the UniTO website, you get your Unito IT and email account (generally known as "SCU credentials"). These are made up of your personal username (name.surname) and password.

After arrival, you officially enrolled your are ("immatricolato") at the University and you can then access all the online services available on the website such as:

- MyUniTO (UniTO.it reserved area)
- Matricola number (UniTO ID number)
- UniTO Email account user@edu.unito.it
- Online career plan (PIANO CARRIERA)
- Online registration to exams (APPELLI)
- CampusNet/Moodle/Webex of your host Department (elearning platforms)
- Free Wi-Fi in University buildings

You should check both your UniTO email account as well as your private one.



Moodle and Webex platforms can be accessed by all students registered to the UniTO portal, including students who are tagged as "prospective students". The Campusnet platform, on the contrary, requires you are fully registered at UniTO (profile "Current Student" with a matricula number).



To report an issue with your UniTO IT and email account, log a ticket with our Help and Support desk.

#### EXTENSION OF THE EXCHANGE PERIOD

Students who want to extend their mobility period at the University of Torino must be authorized by both the UniTO exchange coordinator and by their home University.

In order to ask for an extension you need to:

- Provide via email to UniTO International Mobility internationalexchange@unito.it authorization of the UniTO exchange coordinator and the authorization of your home University.
- In your email please specify the number of additional and the new end date Erasmus/International mobility. This allows you to renew all services at UniTo



The whole exchange period can last a maximum of 12 months.

Extension requests are mandatory to be able to take exams after the official ending of the exchange period, i.e.: beyond the number of months confirmed at the time of application. For example, if your exchange lasts 6 months, you can take exams only within 6 months of your arrival. If you want to take exams beyond the agreed period, you need to ask for an extension.

#### BEFORE LEAVING TURIN

#### REGISTERING THE END OF YOUR EXCHANGE



Registering the end of your exchange is MANDATORY! Without this step you will not receive your Transcript of Records!

To register the end of your exchange you need to:

- •Fill in the "End of Mobility form" providing information on your pending exams, The form is available on our website.
- •Go to <u>InfoPoint</u> to sign your home University documents (End of Mobility Certificate/Departure Certificate/Certificate of Stay).



The ending date of the exchange period will be the date specified on the End of Mobility Form. If you do not complete the form, the official ending date of the exchange period will be the date of your last exam.

## Academic matters

#### UNIVERSITY ORGANISATION

The University of Torino is organized in 27 Departments, Schools and 7 Hub areas ("Polo"). As an exchange student you are assigned to a host Department which is part of a larger Hub/Polo. It is important to keep this information in mind so it will be easier for you to choose courses and get information from the relevant office.

#### LEARNING AGREEMENT

The Learning Agreement – Study Plan is the document listing all the courses you wish to attend and sit exams for during your exchange. This document has to be **approved and signed** by your home University and your relevant Exchange Coordinator at UniTO.

Erasmus Students: a learning agreement is mandatory. International Exchange Students: recommended as guidance but not necessary.

The deadline to have your Learning Agreement – Study Plan signed depends on your home university schedule. In any case both institutions must approve any changes well before the start of the exam sessions at UniTO.

As an exchange student you are assigned to a specific host Department with which your home University has either an Erasmus or an International Exchange Agreement.

Exchange students can choose courses from the host Department/Hub (Polo) which they are assigned to, however, you can also choose some courses provided by other Departments/Hub (Polo). To do so, you must gain approval from BOTH your host Department Exchange Co-ordinator AND the Exchange Co-ordinator of the Department in which the course is taught. Please bear in mind that some restrictions may apply, so please refer to the relevant Polo/Hub for help before filling in or chenging your Learning agreement.

Erasmus Online Learning Agreement: at the moment our system is not fully connected to the EWP network. During this phase, incoming students have to send their Learning Agreement to each person or office for approval by email in pdf format.

## CFU/ECTS CREDITS AND GRADING SYSTEM

Due to different cultural and academic traditions, European educational systems have developed not only different national grading scales but also different ways of using them within the same country, in different subject areas or institutions<sup>1</sup>. To describe the student workload required to complete courses (lectures, individual study, exams, etc...), institutions allocate a standard value to courses, generally known as ECTS credits or CFU (Credito Formativo Universitario) in Italian.

Students participating in an exchange programme will be able to transfer these credits and grades from UniTO to their home University on the basis of a prior agreement between the institutions. This transfer is done through the use of **grade distribution tables**. They represent the statistical distribution of positive grades (pass and above) awarded in each field of study or specific reference group and they can be compared between institutions.

#### CREDITS AT UNITO

#### 1 local credit (CFU) = 1 ECTS credit.

1 CFU corresponds to 25 hours of work including lectures, laboratories, seminars, individual studies etc... Workload for incoming students is set out by sending institutions. As a general guidance, the average workload for 1-year full time studies is 60 CFU

Credits are awarded only when the course is completed and the related exams are passed. Therefore, credits are not awarded for attendance-only courses.

## COURSES AND EXAMS HOW TO FIND COURSES

The list of courses available for every academic year and semester is generally updated from late July each year. It may therefore be likely that you will need to adjust your study plan should courses be cancelled or moved from one semester to the other. In the meanwhile, please have a look at the current offering since changes are generally limited.

#### Course description page

Each course webpage includes all course-information (e.g.: lesson materials, content, credits, mode of delivery, method of assessments, bibliography etc.)



In the section AVVISI (NOTICES) you can find information about the teaching modality (either online or face-to-face) and how to access course materials

The activity banner includes Teaching material, Exams dates, Timetable, Moodle/E-learning, Forums




#### Search courses tools

#### A List of courses across all departments: Course search

Here you have, at a glance, a full list of courses across all departments. For example, searching for "international relations" will bring up all the international relations-related courses. For further details click on the name of the course and then on the link provided under "Detailed report". By using the "Advance search" tool, you can also filter the search by semester, department and more.





## B List of courses in one department/degree programme: department/degree course website.

Select "Studiare" (Study) from the navigation bar at the top of the page and then go to "Insegnamenti" (Courses) from the drop-down menu. The "Elenco completo" button gives you the complete list of courses.



#### CLASS TIMETABLES (ORARIO DELLE LEZIONI)

Each Department/Degree programme may display their lesson plans differently: some may organise it according to the year of delivery (e.g., Year 1 undergraduate, Year 2 undergraduate, etc...), some others may display them according to Degree Programmes, others show all the courses together. As an exchange student, you have access to all courses across all years and degree programmes, so you might have to check all the above-mentioned methods to look for a class timetable. You may choose courses across departments and programmes. Here you can find some general tips to access your class planner:

In the course description page, click on the timetable symbol



- In the main calendar page, you will be able to choose from the following display options:
  - Day/week/month
  - Specific date
  - Full list
  - Print/download calendar





On both the MyUniTO profile and app you can ONLY see the timetable of the courses you registered on your piano carriera (see page 19)

#### REGISTRATION TO COURSES


Registration to courses allows you to take part in lectures (either in-person or online) and get course material. The University uses three e-learning services: Moodle, Campusnet and Webex. The choice of platform depends on the requirement of the course as set out by each Professor.

#### Moodle

You can access the platform by clicking on the icon at the bottom of the course description webpage



Or by clicking on "E-Learning" either on the Department or Degree programme website under "Studiare" or "Didattica"





#### Campusnet

You can access it via either the Department or the Degree Programme website using your UniTO username and password. Bear in mind that your student status must be "current student" to be able to access this platform!

#### WEBEX

This is a web conference service mostly used for online lectures and classes. No software installation is required. You can access Webex from your MyUniTO profile page under the tab: Servizi online/Online services → Virtual Room studenti -Webex; or by using the link provided by the Professor who manages the course.

#### PIANO CARRIERA

The online career plan (PIANO CARRIERA) is an online procedure (through MyUniTO sevices) you must complete to take exams at UniTO and register your grades. You will need to include all the courses listed in your Learning Agreement -Study Plan, the only exception being the Italian language course. This will be included in your Transcript of records by the International Mobility Office. You do not need to fill it in before your arrival, however it must be done before the start of the exam session.

The Piano Carriera is generally open for submission and changes from October to June each year.



The Piano Carriera procedure is different from the registration on courses on campusnet/moodle.

#### **EXAMS (APPELLI)**

Students can schedule their own exam timetable within the timeframe provided by each department. Take note of this timeframe to enroll for exams in time. Check deadlines on your MyUniTO.

As a general rule, for each course you can choose from two or three exam dates (APPELLO) included within the set timeframe for both the first and second semester. This means that if you fail an exam, or you are not satisfied with the result, you can usually retake it. However, please bear in mind that only the last grade you obtained will be registered in your Transcript of Records, regardless of its "value" (either a higher or lower score).



You can take exams ONLY within the confirmed exchange period! For example, if your exchange lasts 6 months, you can take exams only within 6 months of your arrival.

If you want to take exams beyond the agreed period, you need to ask for an extension (see page 7)

#### GETTING YOUR GRADES

When a grade is uploaded online, you will receive an email on your MyUniTO email account. You can keep track of your grades both on your MyUniTO profile and app.

#### Accepting/Refusing a grade:

At the University of Turin exams grades (VOTO) can be either accepted or rejected.

- Oral exams: you need to make your decision on the spot
- Written exams: you need to confirm your decision online. You will have 5 days to accept or reject the result. If you do not act within this timeframe your grade will be registered according to the "silent consent" rule.

Failed exams: If you fail an exam (that is your grade is below 18) this will be registered as «insufficiente» (unsatisfactory). If your home University demands to see this grade as an actual number, please tell the Professor in charge of the exam BEFORE AND DURING the exam.

Internships and other exams: these are registered as "idoneo" (passed). If your home University demands to see this grade as an actual number, please tell the Professor in charge of the exam BEFORE AND DURING the exam.

#### When do I get my results?

The date of publication of results depends on many factors such as the type of exam (oral or written), how many students were assessed on that date, the complexity of the assessment. In the case of an oral exam, you will know your evaluation immediately. The evaluation of written exams may require 3 to 4 weeks. You can ask the Professor who manages the course for an approximate date.



In your Transcript of Records you will find only the exams you have taken and been graded for, attendance-only courses will not be registered. If you need an attendance certificate, please tell the Professor in charge of the course at the beginning of classes so as to receive it by the end of the planned activity.

## Student Services

#### EDISU-RUN STUDENT SERVICES

EDiSU Piemonte is in charge of managing and running most of the services that fall under the name of "Right to Education", which are aimed to give the necessary support to those students who are "capable and deserving, although under-resourced". Such services include housing, study spaces, canteens services etc... EDiSU services are available to international exchange students as well.

#### HOUSING

International students can apply for a room at **University** residences managed by EDISU Piemonte, the local Regional Agency for the Right to Education.

Since places in residence halls are limited, searching on the private market is a common option. UniTo provides international students with a support service for the accommodation research on the private market



Rooms at EDISU are awarded upon a selection of candidates: check the <u>Information on How to Apply</u>.

#### STUDENT RESIDENCE HALLS

These are run by Edisu (the Regional Agency of Piedmont for the Right to Education, see page 22). Each year the University of Turin reserves a limited number of rooms for international exchange students in Edisu residence halls.

To check conditions of allocation, availability, fees, please visit the <u>website</u>.

#### PRIVATE HOUSING MARKET

Since places in residence halls are limited, searching on the private housing market is a common option. Accommodation ads are posted on housing platforms by current tenants, landlords and agencies. Note that most agencies or platforms may ask you to pay a fee when you are searching for housing.

#### **TEMPORARY HOUSING**

Sometimes it may not be possible to find housing before your arrival. In that case, you may consider starting the semester in temporary accommodation from where you can search for a more permanent place to stay.

For short-term stays (hostels, halls of residence, bed & breakfasts), you can check the <u>City of Torino tourism website</u>. Further information on accommodation can be found at the following links.

IMPORTANT: BEWARE OF SCAMS!Before signing any contract or transferring money make sure that the offer is genuine. When searching for housing on the private market always beware of scams.

Some red flags to keep in mind:

- •Scammers often operate from outside the country
- •They say they cannot show you the room/flat
- •They do not provide clear answers
- •They will ask you to transfer money before you have even seen the room/flat

#### **UNIVERSITY CANTEENS**

As an Erasmus or International exchange student you can access the Edisu-run canteens. The canteens and alternative services are spread all over town next to all departments. They provide a wide range of food, including vegetarian, ethnic and gluten-free menus. All prices for Erasmus and International exchange students fall within the "Fascia 1" (Bracket 1): E.g.: Full meal → First course, second course, side dish, bread, fruit → 2.50 €


#### LIBRARIES AND STUDY ROOMS

#### University Libraries

The University of Turin has a large network of libraries providing support for your studies. Borrowing entitlements and loan periods are listed on each library website. You can access your loan status via your MyUniTO profile. All library services are free of charge.

- Your UniTO username and password






It is your personal responsibility to manage your own loans, returns and renewal on time. If you fail to return a book you will need to buy a replacement copy and your Transcript of Record will not be issued until the book is returned or a new copy bought.

#### Study Rooms

In study rooms you can read and study, research information, and use a range of services (photocopying, PCs, free WiFi, etc...). In Turin EDiSU runs study rooms all over the city next to all University departments.



#### **CUS TORINO**

CUS TORINO is the University Sports Centre. It organizes sports activities and tournaments open to both students, staff, and the public. The CUS membership card gives you access to facilities, activities, and discounts. It is valid for one academic year and is free of charge for all students enrolled at the University of Torino, including the Erasmus and international students. You will be able to access CUS centres, courses, and book courts at special prices.

To start a sport or physical activity you are required to provide a medical certificate of good health issued in Italy. This can be obtained from your general practitioner (if you are registered with one), the SUISM Centre or directly at the CUS Torino office.

Before travelling to Italy, make sure to check with your home country healthcare provider (either public or private) if any of their medical policies can be extended to cover your exchange period in Turin or what other conditions may apply. If you have any pre-existing medical conditions, we strongly recommend that you bring with you a certificate in English explaining these conditions and any medication you are receiving.

#### THE HEALTHCARE SYSTEM IN ITALY

The healthcare system in Italy is a regionally based national health service known as Servizio Sanitario Nazionale (SSN – National Healthcare Service). It provides universal coverage to citizens and residents, with public healthcare largely free of charge or covered by a small co-payment for services such as tests, medications and medical assistance provided by specialists.

#### Registering with a doctor

Regardless of your type of health insurance, we recommend that you register with a doctor once in Turin. This will enable you to undergo free outpatient and in-home medical examinations, and to obtain prescriptions for medications and specialist services. You can decide to replace your doctor whenever you want. You can choose one from a list of names and addresses (Italian only) at the ASL (Local Health Authority) closest to you. We suggest you contact the EDiSU service or your Buddy for help.

### EU students, SEE State students (Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) and students from Switzerland

All necessary healthcare is covered by the Italian National Healthcare System: you need to have the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). Please contact the health authorities in your home country for information and/or get one before leaving for Italy. This card ensures that you will have the same access to the public healthcare system (e.g. access to a doctor, hospital admission) as an Italian citizen.

#### Students from countries with bilateral agreements

Students from countries with bilateral agreements benefit of the same health insurance from the SNN: you need to get a specific health certificate from the Health Service Institutions of your home country. Countries include Australia, Brazil, Croatia, Bosnia Herzegovina, Macedonia, Serbia and Montenegro, Principality of Monaco. Make sure you seek out information on the terms and conditions of these certificates before leaving for Italy. You are also eligible for voluntary registration on the National Healthcare system (see paragraph about Non-European students).

#### Non-European students

When applying for your residence permit, you are required to provide evidence of health insurance coverage. The health insurance coverage can be:

• With a private insurance company. It must be valid in Italy and it must have a coverage for the entire period of your stay in Italy.

• With voluntary registration on the National Healthcare System. Voluntary registration gives you the right to obtaining the same health care as an Italian citizen, it has a validity of a calendar year (1st January - 31st December), it is not apportionable and cannot be backdated (e.g., if you apply for it in July, you will need to pay for the whole year regardless). Registration for students costs a minimum of 700 €

#### IMPORTANT!

Medical insurances (both public and private) may not cover repatriation to your country of residence for medical reasons. Students should independently consider purchasing insurance cover that quarantees repatriation for medical reasons, reimbursement of medical expenses and typical additional "travel" policies quarantees.

#### TAX CODE (CODICE FISCALE)

Tax identification code (Codice Fiscale, in Italian) is a mandatory document to identify citizens living in Italy. You will need it - for example - to apply for a residence permit, open a bank account, enter into a tenancy agreement, receive the payment of a scholarship.

#### **Public Transport**




